



Seasonal Drought Outlook

U.S. Seasonal Drought Outlook valid for September 15 - December 31, 2016 **Drought Tendency During the Valid Period** Released September 15, 2016






Depicts large-scale trends based on subjectively derived probabilities guided by short- and long-range statistical and dynamical forecasts. Use caution for applications that can be affected by short lived events. "Ongoing" drought areas are based on the U.S. Drought Monitor areas (intensities of D1 to D4).

NOTE: The tan areas imply at least a 1-category improvement in the Drought Monitor intensity levels by the end of the period, although drought will remain. The green areas imply drought removal by the end of the period (D0 or none).

The PHEPR Branch within the San Francisco Department of Public Health (SFDPH) aims to foster a culture of preparedness. The goal is to protect the public's health – to ensure that in a public health emergency, illness and injury are prevented and/or treated & healthcare services remain operational. PHEPR is active in many aspects of planning, from community resilience, to partnerships with the healthcare coalition.

In a disaster, SFDPH is responsible for assessing the public health/medical needs. Response functions may include: supporting hospitals (alleviating patient surge, fulfilling resource requests), operating a medical shelter, managing infectious diseases, providing medication to the public in a bioterrorist event. In a large-scale emergency, SFDPH would activate the DOC (Department Operations Center) to coordinate the response, maintain situational awareness, facilitate resource requests and provide public health expertise.

Cities Readiness Initiative & Mass Prophylaxis

The Cities Readiness Initiative provides federal funding to large metropolitan cities to facilitate medical countermeasure planning; this refers to the development of plans to rapidly dispense life-saving medication to the public, in response to a bioterrorist attack. The local health department is responsible for this function; the scenario for planning is an inhalational anthrax release, as this is the worst-case situation and requires many critical functions to be carried out in a very narrow time frame. This presentation will provide a brief overview of San Francisco's response strategy and how your agency can play an important role.

CA SHAKEOUT

Are You Ready to ShakeOut?



Major earthquakes can cause unprecedented catastrophes. With earthquakes as an inevitable part of our future, people should make plans and take actions to ensure that disasters do not become catastrophes. What we do now will determine what our lives will be like afterwards. With this in mind, the Earthquake Country Alliance (www.earthquakecountry.org) created the Great California ShakeOut, an earthquake drill and preparedness activity in which everyone can participate, which has now spread throughout many other states and regions.

On October 20, 2016, at 10:20 AM, we will conduct a drill at the San Francisco Federal Building. Additionally, we are encouraging all regional offices to participate in the drill. If your location is not conducting a building wide drill, we encourage employees to still participate at the time of the statewide drill and drop, cover, and hold.
